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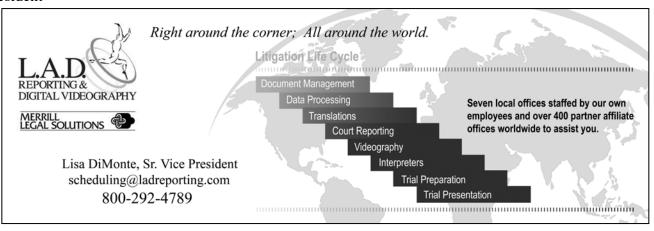

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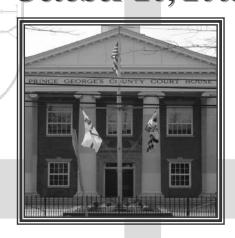

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COMMUNITY LEGAL SERVICES NEWS By Nora C. Eidelman, Deputy Director



We have completed our final report for fiscal year 2009 and submitted it for review to Maryland Legal Services Corporation

(MLSC), our main funder. We are happy to report that in FY09, we increased the number of low income persons we assisted by 5% above our FY08 level. We assisted a total of 8,374 clients including our Judicare/ Contested Custody projects. Our Oxon Hill Clinic and our new Foreclosure Prevention Project are partly responsible for this increase. Unfortunately, notice of funding restrictions forced CLS to close the Oxon Hill Clinic on March 31. Nevertheless, it is still our focus to bring assistance to low income persons living in the southern region of our County and to re-open a clinic in that area when funding becomes available.

The sudden influx of clients seeking foreclosure prevention assistance came to us without warning. When asked to join a state-wide program to combat foreclosure, our Foreclosure Prevention Project was born. We got involved and began to face the challenge of locating necessary resources to operate this project. The program started slowly. We received a small grant from the Maryland Department of Housing & Community Development to hire a part-time person to manage this project, and recently we received another grant from United Way to hire an additional part-time legal assistant to help with this project. Below we share with you one of the success stories from this project:

District Heights homeowner and single father works as a carpenter but was laid off twice in 2008 and as a result, defaulted on his mortgage. He contacted a housing counselor to begin the process of modifying his loan. The counselor referred him to Community Legal Services. He contacted CLS in January of 2009 and was referred to a pro bono attorney in the beginning of February. His attorney worked closely with him to help him prepare his application to the mortgage servicer and then directly negotiated with the servicer to get his rate reduced. After 5 long months of negotiations, the attorney was able to secure for the homeowner a modified loan with monthly payments (including principal, interest, taxes and insurance) less than or equal to 38% of his income and at a fixed interest rate. The homeowner and his family were very happy to be able to remain in their home!

Self-Represented Litigant Orientation

The Spanish Self-Represented Litigant Orientation Committee coordinates the Spanish version of the English language Self-Represented Litigant Orientation. The Orientation is in collaboration with the Family Division of the Circuit Court for Prince George's County and other attorneys and representatives of the

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community. The orientation explains to participants how they may obtain a divorce, custody, child support, or other family law relief.

Funding to Pay for Attorneys Fees

CLS continues to refer cases under our Judicare funding project made available by Maryland Legal Services Corporation. Attorneys receive \$80.00 per hour up to \$1,600.00 per case. Cases referred involve family law matters including guardianship. We also refer domestic violence cases, except we will reimburse the attorney for a maximum of five (5) hours only. 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EVALUATING RISK By Judge Arthur M. Monty Ahalt (Ret.)*

Evaluating risk is the first step to negotiating a fair settlement for your client. It is key to start with a strong foundation. Commencing negotiations with your opponent before developing a disciplined approach to evaluating the case will ultimately result in a weak foundation. And then negotiating with a weak foundation results in a weak settlement. Risk evaluation is the product of diligence. Diligence requires a thorough knowledge of the facts, the forum where the dispute will be resolved, verdicts in similar cases in that forum and experience.

In this context, risk is defined as not achieving expectations of a favorable verdict at trial. Most all litigants who are not able to resolve or settle their cases have very strong convictions about their positions. I call it the "righteousness" of their cause; they sincerely and genuinely believe they are right. In part, that is why they are in court. A plaintiff feels wronged and terribly damaged. A defendant feels they have been dragged into court by an overreaching plaintiff. However, the reality is that one of them is probably not going to achieve their expectations. In many cases neither achieves their expectations.

If the case will ultimately end up in front of a jury, then you want to evaluate what a jury would award your client in the jurisdiction that you will file suit. If a Judge will ultimately hear the case, then you need to evaluate what a Judge would award your client in the jurisdiction that you will file suit.

A majority of personal injury cases end up in front of a jury. It is very important to consider the composition of the jury; six individuals who know nothing

about the parties, will never see them again, are trying to be fair to both sides, are going to decide your case.

Building a strong foundation will put you at a negotiating advantage with your opponent. It also serves four other strategic functions:

- 1. Protects you against a claim of malpractice.
- 2. Impresses your client with the depth of your preparation.
- 3. Gives your client confidence in your ability.
- 4. Allows you to have confidence in front of a judge or jury.

The principles outlined are based upon my 42 years of experience as a trial lawyer (15) and Judge (27). During this time, I've been very fortunate to have very experienced colleagues, teachers and evaluation experts in Judge Albert Blackwell, Judge Jacob Levin and Judge William McCullough.

For many years, I tracked all verdicts in the Circuit Court for Prince George's County, and continue to do so, although the current verdicts are not now published. In the past I have published those verdicts to the bar – they can now be found at http:// virtualcourthouse.info/Prince-George's-County-Jury-Verdicts. html. I volunteered this initiative in an effort to provide the bar with a frame of reference as they evaluated their cases. Additionally, I regularly spoke with colleagues within my county and around the state and region in an effort to discern if the results in Prince George's County they were not were different markedly different. An analysis of the verdicts reveal that roughly five liability scenarios and five injuries comprised well over 80% of the trials.

LIABILITY TRIALS

- 1. Left hand turn
- 2. Change of lane
- 3. Slip and fall
- 4. Red light Green light
- 5. Parking lot aisle

INJURY TRIALS

- 1. Soft Tissue Sprain/Strain of the neck and back
- 2. Broken bones
- 3. Shoulder Rotator Cuff
- 4. Knee meniscus or ligament
- 5. Herniated disk

AS A RESULT OF THIS EXPERIENCE MANY PRINCIPLES EVOLVED.

- 1. Small impact = small verdict
- 2. Liability issue + pre-existing injury/condition = double trouble
- 3. Pain and suffering is not determined by multiplying medical specials
- 4. Damaged employment or employability is generously compensated
- 5. Bad Injury by a Dangerous vehicle (tractor trailer) = large verdict

The verdict tracking and principles gave rise to an evaluation experiment I conducted with the bar. In collaboration with experienced litigation lawyers from both the

plaintiff and defense bar, I created model cases of the recurring liability scenarios and injuries and sent the model cases to five experienced plaintiffs' lawyers and five experienced defense lawyers. I solicited their opinion of a reasonable probable verdict in each model case. The result was remarkable. These experienced lawyers opinions were nearly always the same (within several percentage points of each other). Interestingly, often the plaintiff bar was a little lower and the defense bar a little higher.

The process of evaluating a case must be disciplined and organized. It requires you to accurately identify all RISK factors that will affect your recovery. There are positive and negative risk factors. Positive factors increase the value of your case; negative factors decrease the value of your case. Both are vital and should be evaluated closely. Additionally, there are factors which would, on the surface, appear to affect the value but do not the red herring factor. A word of CAUTION. You cannot — I repeat cannot – properly evaluate the value of a case until you know all of the facts which are relevant to the issues of liability and/or damages.

A STRONG FOUNDATION CHECK LIST.

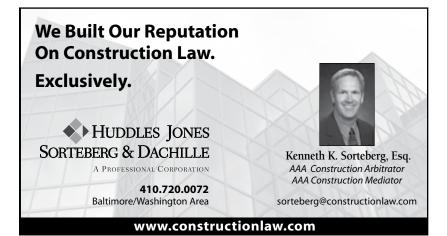
- 1. Knowledge of all facts affecting liability.
- 2. Knowledge of all medical treatment.
- 3. Knowledge of all prior medical treatment.
- 4. Identify all modifying factors.
- 5. Identify comparable verdicts.

- 6. Articulate your evaluation in writing for yourself.
- 7. Obtain several evaluations from more experienced practitioners to test your own evaluation.

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DEBUNKING DIET URBAN LEGENDS

It seems like there's a pill or a cure or a trick to help you reach any type of fitness

goal nowadays. There are myths and rules about what you should or should not do if you want to drop the pounds quickly. And people everywhere inevitably believe and follow some, if not most, of these rules. Sadly, there's no truth to these myths and they should be given the same status as "urban legends" - something people unquestionably believe, which was simply made up by some unknown person. So this month, some of the most common "diet urban legends" will be debunked.

1. Eating late at night causes weight gain.

This myth is untrue though there is some basis for people believing in its efficacy. However, the simple fact of the matter is that the food you eat has the same number of calories no matter what time of day you eat it. Thus, eating late at night doesn't cause you to gain any more weight than eating that same food earlier in the evening. Weight gain occurs when you consume more calories than you expend in daily activity. So the connection that people make between late night eating and weight gain is probably due to the fact that people generally tend to snack on fat laden, unhealthy foods late at night. And those late night calories which have been consumed are less likely to be expended or burned off during exercise because most people don't work out late at night

or in the wee hours of the morning. Thus, in incorrect assumption that eating late at night causes weight gain emerged. But know this: if you consume 1200 calories each day and burn 400 calories each day, you can eat those calories any time of day or night...you will not gain weight.

2. A low carb/ high protein/ no fat diet is the best nutritional combination for losing weight.

This myth is untrue but there is some basis for people believing this myth, as well. While different respond individuals differently to certain types of macronutrient combinations, a diet low in saturated fats has consistently proven to cause weight loss. Because fat has more calories per gram than both carbs and protein, its easier to reduce total calories by reducing fat intake. There are some people who have experienced short term dramatic weight loss by severely restricting both their carbs and fat, but this method of nutrition can lead to low energy, irritability, and cause side effects such as hair breakage/ loss, dry skin, and other symptoms reflective of a lack of much needed nutrients. The best macronutrient combination is to generally reduce unhealthy fats while increasing "good fats" such as Omega 3 and Omega 6. That means replacing fried foods and processed goods with fish. Also, you'll want to reduce starchy carbs and focusing more on natural vegetable carbs. Finally, you want to consume lean proteins with each meal. So generally, many experts believe it's best to keep your percentage of fats to less than 20 percent of your intake, while keeping carbs and proteins to somewhere between 35-40 percent, depending on which feels best for you.

3. Skipping meals is a good weight loss method.

This is probably one of the most accepted myths of nutrition and its one that is flat out wrong. Anyone who watches television has probably seen the commercial about how women who eat a healthy breakfast including a certain cereal, were proven to lose more weight and fat than women who skipped breakfast. Well, I didn't participate in that study but I know enough about nutrition to know that this is absolutely true. Eating breakfast gets your metabolism started in the morning. It's like a wake up call to get your body going. Additionally, every meal you eat has a metabolic response associated with it which triggers your body to turn on the furnace that starts the burning calories. And if these two reasons aren't enough to convince you not to skip meals to loose weight, consider that most people who skip breakfast tend to indulge in a ravenous binge later in the evening, eating substantially more calories than they would have consumed had they eaten that healthy breakfast. Lesson: it's always best to eat a little something than to skip a meal altogether.

4. Grapefruit will speed up your metabolism and cause you to lose weight.

Not true...unless you've replaced a meal of burgers and fries with grapefruit. No particular food item is going to cause you to lose weight, but consuming foods which are very low in calories in place of your typical fat-laden meals will certainly result in fewer calories to end up on your stomach, hips, or thighs. But there is no "magical" component in grapefruit or any other food that makes you lose weight.

5. You can't eat your favorite "bad foods" and still lose weight.

This, again, is a false assumption that has some basis in fact. I love Apple walnut cobbler topped with Vanilla Bean Ice Cream, and I even eat it occasionally. However, if I ate this everyday for dessert, I'd gain a good forty pounds in about a year. But once every other week, and it's no big deal. I just have to add an additional ten minutes or so of cardio exercise to my daily routine that week and try to consume mostly vegetables and fruit for all of my other meals on the day I have that decadent treat. There are no foods that are off limits when you are engaged in a healthy exercise and nutritional program. You just have to indulge in treats moderately and sparingly. It's those who indulge daily or several times per week who seem to gain weight even when all their other meals are super healthy and low in calories. That's because even an otherwise super healthy diet can not undo overindulgence in calorie laden treats - which is probably at the root of the myth that you can't eat your favorite foods and still lose weight.

6. You can lose ten or even twenty pounds of fat in a week and maintain it by using one of those rapid weight loss diets.

Well, this is myth is mostly false and partly true. While you can lose ten or more pounds very quickly on a rapid weight loss program, it is not fat and the likelihood is that you will not be able to maintain it. Rapid weight loss diets can cause you to

drop 10 pounds in a week, but eighty percent of those ten pounds is water, about ten percent is lean muscle mass which you need, and only about ten percent of the weight lost is actually fat....a bad combination. And this is especially true since the minute you go off the rapid weight loss diet program, you'll gain back all of the water lost, some of the fat, but probably none of the muscle unless you specifically engage in some muscle building activity. So this is a recipe for disaster. If you have a special event coming up like a class reunion, vacation, or a wedding and you need to drop weight quickly, do it by eating several small meals each day consisting mostly of vegetables and fish. And drink at least 96 ounces (3 liters) of water daily. This combined with one hour total of exercise five days a week over a three week period will almost certainly result in about a ten pound weight loss with the vast majority of the weight being fat. So take a couple extra weeks to do it the right way, which is the only way fat loss really can be maintained.

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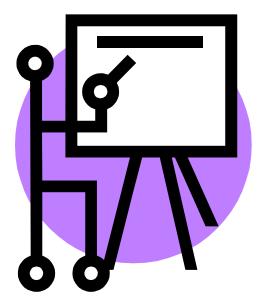
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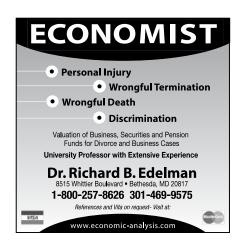
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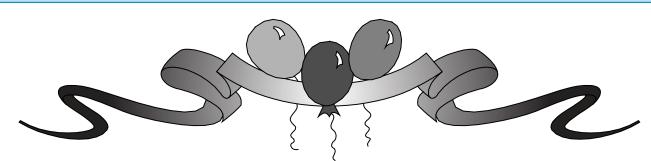
